Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors

All exhibitors are bound by the **Rules of the Show**, which are adapted from the Rules and Standards contained in the RHS Horticultural Show Handbook.

By signing the Entry Form, exhibitors are declaring that the exhibits entered have been produced by them. In the case of potted plants, the exhibits must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 6 months. In flower arranging classes, bought flower or foliage is permitted.

Only one entry per person, per class is permitted.

Adult entry fee is 50p per exhibit up to a maximum of $\pounds 5.00$. Whereafter unlimited entries are free.

Entry forms and fees must be received at the Village Shop by 5.00 p.m. on Wednesday 31st July 2019.

Prize certificates will be given for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards. Any prize may be withheld or modified if there are insufficient entries of the standard required. Money prizes will be awarded for children's classes 68-73 only: £2 for 1st, £1.50 for 2nd and £1 for 3rd.

Exhibitors must stage their exhibits in the Village Hall between 8.30 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. on Sunday 4th August. All exhibitors should leave the Hall by 10.30 a.m. There is no access to the Village Hall for exhibitors between 10.30 a.m. and 2.00 p.m., when judging and administration will take place.

No exhibit may be removed from the Hall until prize giving has taken place which will be at **3.30 p.m.**

Tea and cakes on sale in the Hall between 2pm-4pm.

All exhibits must be removed from the Village Hall by 5.00 p.m.

The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to goods or produce at the Show, nor for any accident or loss affecting persons, animals or property at the Show.

Any disputes arising from the judges' decisions will be considered by the Show Organising Committee. Complaints should be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of £5 which will be forfeited if, in the opinion of the Committee, the complaint is not valid.

Hints for Exhibitors - Fruit and Vegetables

Read the schedule carefully. Check that you place on the Show tables the number of specimens stated in the schedule, for each exhibit. An incorrect number will lead to disqualification. All cultivars should be named if possible. **Vegetables** should be freshly gathered and cleaned so as not to damage the skin. A portion of the tap root of root vegetables should be present

Carrots, parsnips and beets should have leaves removed to approximately 75mm.

Courgettes should be about 150mm long and approximately 70mm in diameter with flowers attached, if possible.

French or runner beans should be straight and not stringy. They should be cut from the vine, leaving about 1cm of stem attached.

Garlic bulbs should be whole, clean and firm, with some root attached.

Potatoes should be of good shape and size appropriate to the cultivar.

Salad Crop may be any variety of lettuce or other salad leaf and should be presented with a portion of root attached

Shallots and onions should have excess loose skin and foliage removed, have tops tied with raffia and be set on sand or rings as appropriate. Please check size and weight specified in the schedule. (rings, sand and raffia will be available at the show).

Squash should be young. Long cultivars should be less than 400mm long and round cultivars should be less that 500mm in diameter.

Tomatoes should be of an appropriate size for the cultivar and presented with the calyx attached. They should be of even size, shape and colour. The number must be as specified in the schedule.

A Trug or Basket of Vegetables. A collection of four different kinds of vegetable from classes 1-24, clean and well-presented in a trug or basket of maximum size 600mm long by 160mm deep. You may not exhibit two varieties of the same kind, for example a red onion and a white onion.

Double points will be awarded for the collection, but vegetables do not need to comply with the criteria specified for individual classes.

Fruits should be shown with the stalk or calyx attached. Do not polish. Handle the fruits as little as possible. Apples and pears need not be ripe and should be of a size appropriate to the cultivar.

Hints for Exhibitors - Flowers and Other

Flowers should be arranged facing forward in an appropriate vase and should be of uniform size with strong stems and without dropping florets. It is recommended that flowers should be cut and placed in a vase the evening before the show to allow them to take up water. Dahlias should be fully open and floribunda roses should be at least 50% open. For all flowers, stems should be presented with a balance of open blooms and buds and a spike should be a complete stem. Where the schedule calls for a specific number of blooms, be aware that a bud counts as a bloom. A limited number of small and medium display vases are available. Flower arrangements may be arranged at home and brought to the Village Hall for finishing and staging. An exhibit should be composed of natural plant material, which may be fresh, dried or preserved, with or without accessories, placed within the space specified in the Show schedule. It is recommended that water retaining material is used but it is important that it should be concealed with natural plant material. It is important that flower arrangements reflect the theme specified in the schedule, using appropriate materials and container.

Produce and Preserves may be sampled by the judge for consistency and taste. Baked or cooked items should be covered with cling film or placed in a polythene bag. Preserves are best once matured and therefore recommended to be a minimum of 3 months old. All jams, preserves, chutneys and drinks should be labelled and dated. Jars should be sealed with cellophane or new lids, as appropriate to the product. Do not recycle commercial jars and lids. Savoury items should not include meat or fish.

Arts, Crafts, Photography and Family Section exhibits should be original work of the entrant. Children's exhibits should have the age of the child clearly marked on the exhibitor card. Where there is doubt about the authenticity of an exhibit, it will not be judged.

- 1 Potatoes -3 tubers white
- 2 Potatoes -3 tubers other than white
- 3 French beans 6 pods
- 4 Runner beans 6 pods
- 5 Mange Tout or Sugar Snap Peas 6 Pods
- 6 Broad Beans 6 Pods
- 7 Onions 3 dressed (optional), each 225g or less in weight
- 8 Onions 3 dressed (optional), each over 225g in weight
- 9 Shallots 6 on a dish, large, over 30mm in diameter
- 10 Shallots 6 on a dish, small, less than 30mm in diameter
- 11 Lettuce or salad leaf 2 of one variety, with root attached
- 12 Carrots 3 of one variety, with approximately 75mm of foliage
- 13 Beetroot 3 of one variety, with half foliage attached
- 14 Marrow or squash an equally matched pair
- 15 Tomatoes medium, 3 on a plate, 50mm in diameter or more
- 16 Tomatoes cherry variety, 10 on a plate, each 35mm or less in diameter
- 17 Courgettes 3, 150mm long approximately flower attached if possible
- 18 Cucumbers a pair. Ridge or greenhouse varieties
- 19 Garlic any variety, 3 bulbs with some root and stem attached
- 20 Spinach or Chard 7 stems
- 21 Sweetcorn 2 heads
- 22 Herbs 3 different herbs in labelled jars
- 23 Radish 6 on a plate (any variety) with 30mm of foliage
- 24 Any other vegetable up to 3 specimens or a bunch
- 25 A trug or a basket containing a selection of four different vegetables

FRUIT Classes 26 - 31

- 26 Raspberries 12 stalks attached
- 27 Plum -3 of one variety with stalk attached
- 28 Soft fruit on a plate 12 of one variety or 200g maximum
- 29 Pears 3 of one variety
- 30 Apples 3
- 31 Any other fruit (other than the above) 1 or more fruit

FLOWERS Classes 32 - 55

Variety to be stated where possible

- 32 Cosmos 3 blooms
- 33 Clematis 3 blooms
- 34 Dahlias 3 of one variety 155m in diameter or less
- 35 Dahlias 3 of one variety 150mm in diameter or more
- 36 Dahlias 5 mixed
- 37 Delphinium 1 spike
- 38 Rudbeckia 3 stems
- 39 Gladiolus -1 specimen spike
- 40 Gladioli 3 spikes
- 41 Hydrangea mop-head (Hortensias large round heads) 3 blooms
- 42 Hydrangea lace cap (flat head with large outer blooms) 3 blooms
- 43 Penstemon 3 spikes
- 44 Phlox 3 stems
- 45 Rose 3 stems cluster flowered rose
- 46 Rose 3 stems large flowering rose
- 47 Rose 1 specimen stem
- 48 Rose 1 stem to be judged by scent

- 50 Collection of 10 spikes, sprays or blooms no more than 2 of one variety

- 51 Any other perennial 3 stems, spikes or blooms

FLORAL ARRANGEMENT Classes 56 - 58

- 56 A floral arrangement in a teacup or mug
- 57 A centre piece arrangement overall approximately 60cm
- 58 An arrangement in a jug an informal arrangement of flowers and foliage in water

PHOTOGRAPHY Classes 59 - 64

Classes 59 - 64 are for amateur photographers only. Photographs will be judged on the creative use of the medium to represent the theme for each class.

Prints may be colour or black and white.

Class 64 should be a collection of 4 photographs, mounted on card.
